EU role in vaccination for COVID-19

- Public health policy is a Member State competence
- Exceptions for cross border health threats where legislation exists (surveillance, alert, risk assessment and risk management coordination)
- EU pharmaceutical legislation for evaluation and authoriation of medicines including vaccines
- Supported by several EU agencies (EMA and ECDC)






vaccine Strategy

The European Vaccine Strategy aims to

- secure the production of vaccines within the EU
- ensure sufficient supplies for our Member States through Advance
 Purchase Agreements with vaccine producers
- adapt the EU's regulatory framework to the current emergency
- use the flexibility of our rules to speed up the development, authorisation and availability of vaccines

Key actions to date





Working closely with Member States

- Our Vaccine strategy should act as a **reference point for Member States** when formulating their national strategies
- People can be vaccinated according to national vaccine programmes
- The Commission supports EU countries in the preparation and implementation of their vaccine campaigns, including via communication material
- The Commission also put in place a common reporting framework and a platform to monitor the effectiveness of national vaccine strategies

Vaccine doses secured

- The Commission has secured up to **2.6bn vaccine doses** so far:
- BioNTech-Pfizer: 600 million doses
- Moderna: 460 million doses
- CureVac: 405 million doses
- AstraZeneca: 400 million doses
- Johnson&Johnson: 400 million doses
- Sanofi-GSK: 300 million doses




Vaccination strategies

- All Member States have access to COVID-19 vaccines at the same time
- Distribution done on a per capita basis to ensure fair access
- National vaccination strategies and priority groups
- 19 January 2021: Communication calling on Member States to speed up the roll out of vaccines across the EU.
- Objectives: By March 2021, at least 80% of people over the age of 80, and 80% of health and social care professionals in every Member State should get vaccinated.
 By summer 2021, Member States should have vaccinated a minimum of 70% of the entire adult population



The COVID-19 Vaccine tracker by the ECDC



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


Cumulative uptake (%) of the first dose in healthcare workers in EU/EEA countries as of 2021-04-12

CORONAVIRUS GLOBAL RESPONSE

Commission launches **Coronavirus Global Response** in May 2020 to mobilise funds for research and development of tests, treatments and vaccines, strengthen health systems and the global recovery close to €16 billion pledged

ACT-ACCELERATOR

The Access to COVID-19 Tools Accelerator was launched at the end of April 2020 by the WHO, the EU and global health organizations to:

 Accelerate development of COVID-19 vaccines, tests and treatments Ensure equitable global access Strengthen health systems

ACT-A brings together governments, scientists, civil society, charities and global health organizations.

Last update: 12 April 2021



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- Will allow 27 Member states to share EU purchased doses with third countries, including through COVAX
- EU has secured 2.6 billion doses from six vaccine producers for Europe, with the possibility to share with other countries, in particular the Western Balkans, the EU's Neighbourhood and Africa



- We need to make progress with global vaccination and prepare health systems for future pandemics, especially in the most vulnerable countries
- EU has invested over €1.1 billion to strengthen health systems in 13 African countries: Burkina Faso, Burundi, Central African Republic, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia, Guinea (Conakry), Guinea Bissau, Libya, Mauritania, Morocco, Nigeria, Sudan, Zimbabwe



- EUCO 23.3: The European Union will continue to strengthen its global response to the pandemic. Work on setting up a vaccine-sharing mechanism must be taken forward rapidly so as to complement and support COVAX's leading role in ensuring universal access to, and deployment of, vaccines.
- Global Health Summit, Rome, 21 May 2021. G20 Leaders, International and regional organisation heads and representatives of global health bodies will share lessons learned from the pandemic and agree principles supporting further cooperation and joint action preventing future global health crisis, irrespective of origin and in spirit of solidarity
